March 24, 1944, was set by the Selective Service director as the date upon which it will be determined whether men are age 26 or over.

Deferments will be continued for only a relatively few younger workers regarded as virtually irreplaceable in their war jobs. Such jobs getting consideration are those leading to output of products insufficient at present to meet war needs. Otherwise draft deferments in the 18-26 age group all will be vigorously slashed.

Even today a special interagency committee of the War Manpower Commission is working out a list of workers by plants and activities who will receive the few industrial deferments to be left.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(185)
—Senator Warren R. Austin (R),

"This plan picks on a lot of

Austin, co-author of the Austin-Wadsworth national service
bill, declared that legislation to
force 4-F men into war plants,
is far worse than enactment of a
general national service obligation.

"So far as winning the war
goes, the tendency of this maneuver with 4-F's is to postpone solution of the manpower problem
and that means postponing the
end of the war," said Austin.
"That means increase in the loss
of lives."
