Lawyer Put

New York Is Arrested For Violating Statute

Faces \$2,500 Fine

Appearing For Person Without Being Retained

Arthur H. Madison, a New York negro lawyer, recently active in bringing appeals in Montgomery Circuit Court on behalf of members of his race refused registration by the County Board of Registrars, was receited here last night by deputies of Sheriff G. A. Mosley's office on five warrants charging as many violations of a 50-year-old Alabama statute making it illegal for an attorney to act for a person without being employed

Madison was removed from the home of a kinsman on Hall Street and locked up at the county jul-until five bonds, each in the sum of \$500 had been furnished and approved when he was released, A hearing in Common Pleas Court early this week is indicated.

Signers of the bonds were Lew A. Sanderson, local attorney, and Nev W. F. Madison, White hind Rev W. F. Madison, David L. Madison and E I. Madison, ne-

The warrants, all of which are identical, accuse Madison bringing appeals from the Board of Registrars' action on behalf of five persons who had not em-ployed him. It was regalled that of the eight negroes, on whose behalf, the first batch of appeals were entered, five subsequently came into cheuit court and made affidavits that they had not employed Madison or authorized him

LONDON, April 8 --- (49) ---American actial fleets totaling the Southeast about 1,500 planes surged over Germany today, with U. S. heavy bombers ripping two already-buttered aircraft plants at Brunawick and tive airdromes north of the Ruhr while American fighters shot down 92 German planes and destroyed and damaged many others on the ground,

From all the day's operations, which included an attack on the Belgian rail center of Hasselt and sweeps by Thunderbolts and Lightnings against andromes in the Frankfurt area, 34 U.S. hombers and 25 fighters are missing, an Army communique said.

No fighter opposition was encountered over the andromes, as the German sir force concentrated its interceptors for a desperate defense of the Brunswick targets, where the war bulletins said the U.S. Flying Fortresses and Laberators bombed their objectives "visually with good is-Kultz.
