The county board of registrars, convening for the Summer term yesterday at the courthouse, was met by an unprecedented humber of negroes requesting regis-tration and approximately 50 applications from them were re-ceived by the board during the day

Shepherding the negroes to the courthouse and apparently serving them as friendly adviser was Arthur A. Madison, New York negro attorney, who is a native of Madisoh Park and was formerly admitted to the practice of law in Alabama until disbarred several months ago.

Appearance of the negroes for registration was not unexpected inasmuch as Madison, during his recent trial, admitted an earlier boast that he, would "register, 5,000 negroes in Alabama.

The applicants for registration were admitted to the board two at a time, but Madison was never seen to enter the east courtroom where the registrars were con-There was no report of vened. disorder at any time during the day, the negroes waiting their turn in groups of 25 to 30 in the upstairs corridor. Others waited on the courthouse steps and the sidewalk.

While around 50 applications were received, none was ruled on yesterday. The Alabama law gives the board "a reasonable time" to rule on applications, and if there are a great many or if considerable investigation must be made, the time may run into several weeks or longer.

Some months ago, during the Winter session, the Board of Registrars denied application of ap-proximately 15 negroes for registration as voters. Appeals were taken to the Circuit Court in most of these cases by Arthur Madison who had aided the parties in making application to the board.

Later, before the appeals were heard, five of the parties who had applied for registration appeared voluntarily in Circuit Court and made oath that Madison had not heen employed by them to take appeal and that he had appealed in their name without their au-
