Madison Guilty, Says High Court onviction of Arthur A. Madi-

sor, negro lawyer, on charges of unauthorized practice, was upheld yesterday by the Alabama Court of Appeals. Madison, a Montgomery County native and a resident of New York, was convicted in Montgomery County last May on a charge of filing a petition in Circuit Court to determine the voting

qualifications of a negro school teacher, without the latter's having retained him. In that case he was fined \$500 inight. and declared incompetent to prac-; tice in Alabama courts. In lieu of payment of fine and costs, the sentence was 184 days at hard

Madison was convicted in four similar cases in county Common Pleas Court. All were appealed to Circuit Court, but after passing judgment in one, Judge Eugene W. Carter postponed the others pending a ruling of the State Appellate Court.

Whether Madison will carry the Appellate Court's ruling to the State Supreme Court was not learned immediately.
