"A CLINIC ON CLINICS ON CLINICS" (a state clinic on district clinics on local clinics)

This blueprint for increased involvement of members was developed by representatives of the Alabama Education Association and the Alabama State Teachers Association at the New Orleans Political Clinic. In order to allow each state association sufficient leeway in the development of its activities, these plans are general in nature. Each state association will structure its program in keeping with the particular needs of its membership.

I. Statement of Purpose

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Through the involvement of their total memberships, the Alabama Education Association and the Alabama State Teachers Association will coordinate their efforts to achieve educational goals which are mutually desirable to all the teachers in Alabama.

II. Reasons for Initiating the Project

- A. Alabama ranks low in per pupil expenditure.
- B. Pupil-teacher ratio needs to be lowered.
- C. Teachers need "time to teach", (freedom from clerical tasks).
- .D. Local governing bodies lack autonomy.
- E. There is a lack of financial support for an expanded educational enterprise.

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- F. Teachers lack the know-how to convey the needs of education to the lay public.
- G. Inadequate salaries make it difficult to attract and hold competent personnel.
- H. Members of AEA and ASTA want to provide quality education for all Alabama youth.

III. Analysis of the Problem

A. Assets

- 1. Qualified teaching personnel
- 2. Strong professional organizations at the state, district and local levels
- 3. Increasing awareness, on the part of teachers and lay citizens, of the needs of education in Alabama

- 4. Recognition of the importance of education in developing the state's economy

- 2. Disinterested teachers and community members
- 3. Apathy on the part of teachers toward becoming involved in political concerns of the community, state and nation
- 4. Failure of teachers to compete favorably with special interest groups in achieving state support for education
- 5. Reluctance, on the part of teachers, to openly advocate change which will benefit education
- 6. Lack of incentive for teachers to improve their professional skills

IV. Plan of Action

In order to promote teacher involvement in government, the Alabama Education Association and the Alabama State Teachers Association are planning political clinics in each of the organizations at the state, district and local levels. These clinics will be designed to develop positive attitudes, to motivate teachers toward becoming actively involved, to develop know-how, and to design ways to attack and solve specific problems.
