

GREETINGS:

This Yuletide Season arrived too swiftly for one of us, too slowly for the other of us. It followed our "seventeenth summer" together, a summer when the older of us learned to appreciate Kahlil Gibran's wisdom that children "...come through you but not from you,/And though they are with you yet they belong not to you."

Several interesting books crossed my desk this year. Peter Ferrara's Social Security: The Inherent Contradiction makes a strong case for transforming Social Security into a social insurance program only, eliminating its current welfare aspects. Ferrara will be the major presenter at a seminar on "Social Security and Aging Blacks," 10-11 March 1982, sponsored by the Department of Human Development, School of Human Ecology, Howard University. I certainly want to learn more about his proposal because I believe blacks could benefit enormously if it were enacted by the U.S. Congress. Linda Mc-Murry's George Washington Carver: Scientist and Symbol evaluated Carver's scientific and symbolic contributions, leading a reviewer, David Donald of Harvard University, to conclude that Carver "...is no longer part of our usable past." That statement may well lead many of us to begin to think about which black leaders today are a part of our usable present, a very important task as we begin 1982, 116 years away from slavery.

I am excited by my scheduled departure on 8 January for a ten-week international term abroad in the Dominican Republic, where I will live with a family. I hope to become competent in Household Spanish and improve my cross-cultural skills. In June, with a little bit of luck and a lot of hard work, I will graduate from Northfield Mount Hermon School and set my sights toward college. Wow!
