MONTGOMERY -- From the sound of things at the semi-annual convention of the Alabama Democratic Conference, Inc. (ADCI), you might never have guessed that George C. Wallace is running his wife for governor.

During the Negro political group's twoday meeting here in the Jefferson Davis Hotel, no speaker mentioned the governor or his wife, Lurisen.

instead, the Negro Democrats pointed to the dozens of Negroes holding public

ffice in Alabama, and heard friendly messages from two thite politicians.

Delegates to the convention received a warm greeting from .B. Sullivan, Montgomery's commissioner of public safety nd one-time enemy of civil rights groups. Sullivan hailed be group as "fellow Democrats."

On Sunday afternoon, Robert Vance of Birmingham became pe first chairman of the Alabama Democratic Executive ommittee ever to speak to a Negro audience. The head of se state Democratic party told the ADCI members: "The time is past when you take one message to one group people, and another message to another group,"

Saturday night's guest speaker, E.T. Kehrer of Atlanta, Ga., Southern director of the AFL-CIO's civil rights department, didn't talk about Wallace, either. But he said Lester Maddox, the Democratic candidate for governor in his state, and U.S. Representative Howard "Bo" Callaway, a conservative Republican, "Between whom do you choose?" he ask-"A Kluxer in a bedsheet or a Kluxer in a tuxedo?"

Kehrer claimed that the "so-called riots" in Atlanta last month "were stimulated by agent provocateurs to influence the election," The resulting "white backlash" gave Maddox the Democratic nomination, Kehrer said,

But the ADCI delegates seemed not to be bitter about the nominations of Mrs. Wallace and Maddox. Many speakers re-affirmed their belief in working within the Alabama Democratic party structure.

"We're moving," said Peter Hall of Birmingham, "It may be at a snail's pace, but that turtle, he got there faster than the hare."

It was announced that more than five dozen Negro Democrats hold elective and appointive city and county offices in Macon, Mobile and Jefferson counties.

"To those who would start a third party, I say "Farewell." History's overloaded with failures of this sort," said Joe L. Reed of Montgomery. "If you don't like what's going on in the Democratic party, the only way to change it is to work within the framework of it,"

"We're Democrats. We've got to support the Democratic party and the Democratic candidates," said Hall, That was as close to an outright election endorsement as the conven-

- 2) Receive weekly reports from the Section Leaders and prepare a compiled "Weekly Precinct Activity Report" (see attachment 3) for submission to the County Chairman once a week.
- 3) Receive the "Name" and "Address" cards from the Section Leaders and keep them on file.
- 4) After you are satisfied that your precinct has been thoroughly covered and your files are up to date, make two or more copies of an alphabetical list of all registered voters in the precinct. Submit atleast one of these copies to the County Chairman.
- 5) Appoint the following committees: (a) Telephone Committee, (b) Transportation committee, (c) Baby-sitting Committee, and (d) Poll Worker Committee.
- 6) Insure that the workers are supplied with forms, information and days in which the Registrar's Office is opened for registration.
- 7) Have regular meetings with the Section Leaders.

- COUNTY CHAIRMAN -

- 1) Hold weekly meetings with all Precinct Captains in the county, receiving their "Weekly Precinct Activity Reports".
- 2) Prepare and submit to the District Chairman a "Monthly County Activity Report" compiled from the reports of the Precinct Captains. (Attach 4)
- 3) Insure that the precincts have efficient leaders.
- 4) Appoint chairmen for the following committees: (a) Registration, (b) Speakers, (c) Publicity, (d) Finance and (e) Research.
- 5) Keep the committees busy, and the organization functioning.

- DISTRICT CHAIRMAN -

- 1) Hold a monthly meeting of all County Chairmen receiving their reports and discussing all problems encountered, resolving them if possible.
- 2) Insure that the district has adequate County Chairmen.
- 3) Meet with and submit reports to State Cimirman monthly.
- 4) Insure that the entire District is well organized.

Outlined below are the duties and responsibilities of various echelons ranging from blockworkers to the state chairman. If these procedures are followed our organization will grow immeasurbly.

- BLOCKWORKER -

- 1) Know your area of responsibility and every adult residing therein.
- 2) Know the status of every adult resident by making regular door-to-door canvasses (surveys).
- 3) When making the surveys note in the "remarks" section of the survey sheet all information that will help classify the voter such as: "need help at poll", "need transportation to poll", "need baby-sitter", "Will work", etc.
- voters

 4) Make regular checks with all registered/encouraging them to vote on election day and with all unregistered persons urging them to get registered.
- 5) Give the Section leader a copy of all survey sheets and keep a copy to work from.
- 6) Keep the Section Leader posted on all newcomers and persons moving from your area.
- 7) Submit a "Workers Weekly Report" to the section leader weekly.

- 8) Be courteous, polite and helpful to people with personal difficulties.
- 9) Attend precinct meetings as often as possible.

- SECTION LEADER -

- 1) Secure a sufficient amout of good, interested blockworkers to cover the entire section assigned you. Blockworker should live in the area assigned him or her.
- 2) Receive a copy of the blockworkers' survey sheets, fill out an "Address Card" and a "Name Card" for each registered voter.
- Make-up and submit to the Precinct Captain the "Section Leaders Weekly Report" (see attachment 2) from information secured from all of the "Blockworkers Weekly Reports"; also the "Name"and "Address" cards. This should be accomplished weekly.
- 4) Have regular meetings with the blockworkers and the Precinct Captain.

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

He was national co-chairman for the Committee of Educators for Humphrey-Muskie in 1968.

Chairman Reed is also one of the original founders of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee.

The big issue before blacks in Alabama in the 1972 Democratic National Convention is whether or not we are going to take the 1968 Voting Rights Act and make politicians behave.

There is no question but that there is disagreement between John Cashin and myself over the role of black politics.

NDPA CONVENTION FULL OF VIOLATIONS

Dr. John Cashin must be laughing up his sleeve at his own rump party convention held on May 27. It was bossism at its worst and he thinks he is getting away with it.

He selected an inaccessible convention site only 17 miles from the Mississippi line, the tiny rural town of Epes, Alabama (population 293).

His delegates which he wants seated at Miami Beach supposedly were selected at NDPA mass meetings around the state. When the National Democratic Party's own hearing officer looked at Cashin's record, however, he found some startling revelations.

The so-called mass meetings were held in only 19 of Alabama's 67 counties. Statewide a total of 217 persons participated in all of the mass meetings.

Who speaks for blacks in Alabama?

Certainly not Dr. John Logan Cashin, the rich Huntsville dentist who lives in the white community and drives a Rolls Royce.

Dr. Cashin is in fact a late-bloomer in the Alabama civil rights struggle who is trying desperately to take credit for breakthroughs he had nothing to do with.

Where was Dr. Cashin during the Montgomery bus boycotts? Where was Dr. Cashin when fire hoses and police dogs were turned on demonstrators and school children in Birmingham? What was he doing during the Selma to Montgomery March? The good doctor wasn't seen at any of these places.

The chairman of the rump National Democratic Party of Alabama (NDPA) is a smooth talker to be sure but that's about as far as it goes. Cashin's claim to fame is in the field of political opportunism, not

COLOR LINES FALL IN ALABAMA LEGISLATURE

History was made during the last regular session of the Alabama Legislature when State Reps. Fred Gray and Thomas Reed took their seats in the Alabama House of Representatives.

They became the first blacks to sit in the legislative halls in Montgomery since Reconstruction—and representing George Wallace's home district to boot.

Both are well known fighters in the field of civil rights.

Reed, a successful businessman, is also state president of the NAACP.

Gray, an attorney, has rights cases over the past Thus ended a 100-year fight 15 years in Alabama's stormy Middle District.

Holmes: Alabama's Black Militant

Alvin Holmes, Alabama's fiery black militant who is the field director for the Alabama Democratic Conference (black caucus), has been actively involved in the civil rights movement in Alabama since his college days.

While at Alabama State University Holmes and other student leaders organized one of the first sit-in demonstrations in the nation at a public res-taurant in the Montgomery County Courthouse.

Alvin Holmes was also very actively involved in civil rights activities with the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC).

He has been dismissed from several positions by the white power structure for his leadership in the area of opposing discriminatory policies by city and state governments.

These dismissals have caused

entire university student bodies to go on strike in support of Holmes and also brought Hosea Williams and other SCLC staff members to his aid.

Holmes' most recent battle involves the re-naming of Jackson Street and parts of Interstates 65 and 85 in Montgomery as "Martin Luther King Expressway."

Alvin Holmes has led a militant fight against white racists in Alabama and as a result of his strong stand has been beaten and placed in jail on many occasions. But, quoting Dr. King, Holmes said there is often very little material gain with-

out some personal pain. For his efforts, Alvin Holmes, who won 4,163 votes in grabbing a seat in Alabama Democratic National Convention delegation, is being challenged by the mi-nority faction, NDPA, which could turn out only five people in a mass meeting May 2 to "nominate" his challenger.

CONSTITUTION

of

THE ALABAMA DEMOCRATIC CONFERENCE, INC.

Article I - Name

This organization shall be known by, and do business under the name of "The Alabama Democratic Conference, Incorporated."

Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to bring together in one organization, through duly elected representatives, members of city and county Democratic organizations within the state, to stimulate and facilitate the organization of such groups where none exists, and to advocate an advance the principles and goals of the National Democratic Party.

Article III - Membership

The Alabama Democratic Conference shall be composed of a specified number of bona fide Democrats elected to represent the Congressional Districts within the State. Each Congressional District shall have the number of votes equivalent to the number of representatives in the lower house of the Alabama Legislature.

Article IV - Meetings

The Alabama Democratic Conference shall meet annually on the second Sunday in April. Special sessions may be called by the chairman upon approval of a majority of the members of the Board of Directors. A quorum of the Conference shall consist of at least 27 members; representing at least five Congressional Districts.

Article V - Officers

- Section 1. The elected officers of the Conference shall consist of a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary, an assistant secretary, a treasurer, a parliamentarian, and a chaplain. An officer shall hold office for one year, or until a successor has been elected. Officers may succeed themselves in office.
- Section 2. All officers shall be elected annually by ballot at the annual meeting, and shall be installed immediately.
- Section 3. The Board of Directors shall consist of the elected of- ficers, the chairmen of standing committees, and the District Representatives. Representatives-at-large; may serve on the Board of Directors as alternates to the District Representatives.
- Section 4. The executive committee of the Board of Directors shall consist of the elected officers.
- Section 5. An executive committee quorum shall consist of at least four (4) elected officers.

Article VI-- Vacancies

In the event of death, physical or mental disability, or other disqualifications of the chairman, the vice chairman shall take over the duties of the Chairman's Office, and shall conduct such office until the next regular election. In the event of the death or disqualification of any other elected officer, the executive committee shall, by majority vote, appoint a successor to serve until the next regular election.

Article VII - Dues and Assessments

Each County and each City Democratic Conference shall be assessed ten cents annually for each registered Democrat in the County or City Conference, payable in two installments. Contributions to the National Democratic Party may be made in the form of membership dues or donations through the State Conference.

Article VIII - Amendments and Revisions

Any proposal to amend must come from at least ten members from at least three Congressional Districts 90 days before the annual meeting in April. The proposal must include the signatures of the members, and must be sent to the chairman, and a copy to the secretary. Any amendment may be changed at the time of the annual meeting as long as the modification is germane to the original proposal, and is voted favorably by 2/3 of the members present and voting.

BY-LAWS

Article I - Membership

- Section 1. The Alabama Democratic Conference shall be composed of a specified number of representative sof county and City Democratic Conferences or Clubs from each Congressional District in Alabama.
- Section 2. Each county within a Congressional District which has at least 100 financial Democrats shall be entitled to a representative.
- Section 3. The names of the representatives and their alternates must be certified to the Secretary of the Alabama Democratic Conference by the president or chairman and secretary of the County or City Conference immediately after they are elected or appointed.

Article II - Meetings

The regular annual meeting shall be held on the second Sunday in April at a place designated by the Conference or the Board of Directors. Special sessions of the Conference may be called by the chairman upon approval of a majority of the Board of Directors. Special sessions may be held only after members have had twenty days notice. Board meetings may be called by the chairman, or by one-third of the members of the Board.

Article III - Officers

The officers of the Alabama Democratic Conference shall be (1) a chairman, (2) a vice chairman, (3) a secretary, (4) an assistant secretary, (5) a treasurer, (6) a parliamentarian, and (7) a chaplain.

Article IV - Duties of the Officers

It shall be the duty of the chairman to preside at all meetings of the Conference and of the executive committee, and to see that the Constitution and policies of the Conference are carried out. The chairman shall appoint all standing committees. and any other committees considered necessary to carry out the program of the Conference.

The vice chairman shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the chairman, and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by

The secretary shall keep all records of the Conference, record the minutes of each meeting of the Conference and of the executive committee, receive all monies of the Conference, and issue vouchers for checks against the account of the Conference.

The assistant secretary shall act as secretary in the absence of the secretary, and at the direction of the chairman.

The treasurer shall receive all monies given to him by the secretary, deposit same in a commercial bank, and issue checks upon vouchers received from the secretary.

The parliamentarian shall see that the meetings are conducted according to parliamentary procedure.

The chaplain shall open and close each meeting with prayer.

Article V - Revenue

The revenue of this Conference shall come from membership dues and assessments, and from such other activities which are deemed appropriate. In order for a member to be eligible to vote in the annual meeting and to be eligible for election to office or appointment to committees, the assessment of the County or City Conference or Club which he represents must be fully paid by March 15.

Article VI - Election of Officers

At each annual meeting there shall be elected a nominating committee of five whose duty it will be to prepare a slate of candidates for presentation at the next annual meeting. Each member of the committee shall be from a different Congressional District. Candidates may be nominated from the floor. Voting may be secret or open ballot. Candidates receiving a majority of votes shall be declared elected.

The chairman of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of all committees.

Article VII - Committees

The standing committees of the Conference shall be: -

- 1. Budget
- 2. Equal Jobs and Opportunities
- 3. Finance
- Legislation
- Membership

- 6. Organizing
- 7. Program
- Public Relations and Research 8.
- 9. Voting and Registration
- 10. Women's Activities

The chairmen of the Committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Conference. Other members of the committees shall be appointed by the District Representatives, or by the Chairman of the Conference.

Article VIII - Duties of Committees

- 1. <u>Budget</u>. This committee shall prepare the annual budget and present it to the Conference at its annual meeting.
- Equal Jobs and Opportunities. This committee shall stimulate, seek, secure, and disseminate information concerning "equal jobs and opportunities" in public and private organizations.
- 3. <u>Finance</u>. The Finance Committee shall propose and plan special fundraising projects when needed, be responsible for receiving financial contributions at the public meetings at the annual meetings, and on other special occasions, and shall perform such other duties as the executive committee may authorize in order to provide the Conference with adequate funds.
- 4. <u>Legislation</u>. It shall be the duty of this committee to analyze and evaluate proposed or pending legislation; to recommend support legislation conducive to the general welfare, and opposition to, and repeal of, legislation not in the public interest; to recommend needed legislation.
- 5. Membership. This committee shall consist in part of the chairmen of the membership committees in the Congressional Districts, and shall have the responsibility of identifying and certifying the County Democratic Clubs which are bona fide financial members of the Conference. (The Membership Committee is the Credentials Committee.)
- 6. Organizing. The primary function of this committee shall be that of stimulating and facilitiating the organization of county-wide Democratic Clubs in those counties in which they do not exist, and that of facilitating their financial affiliation with the Conference.
- 7. <u>Program.</u> This committee shall develop for the Conference program proposals which shall be submitted to the executive committee, and shall execute such program activities as the executive committee may assign.
- 8. Public Relations and Research. It shall be the duty of this committee to interpret the Conference to the public and to advise the officers and members of the Conference as to decisions and activities most appropriate for creating and maintaining the most effective public image. It shall, also, be the duty of this committee to assemble through inquiry, investigation, and formal research such data as would be of value to the Conference, and to present such to the Conference in an effective manner.
- 9. <u>Voting and Registration</u>. This committee shall assemble and disseminate through the most appropriate channels such information as might promote the most effective voting on the part of the electorate, and facilitate the registration of the unregistered.
- 10. Wo n's Activities. The duty of this committee shall be that of formulating and recommending to the executive committee programs designed to facilitate the effective participation of women in the Party, and to execute the approved programs.

Article IX - Roberts Rules of Order

The Conference shall be governed by Roberts Rules of Order.
