

He was a Civil Rights Activist since the 1940's. He became involved in Voter Registration believing that in order to be a full fledged citizen you must be registered to vote. He taught Veterans returning from World War II. Lewis believed that if a man could go to war and fight for his country, he should also be entitled to vote. The Veterans School was at St. Jude and Booker T. Washington High Schools. In the early 50's, Coach Lewis owned and operated the Citizens Club, where to be a member, you had to be a registered voter or be enrolled in classes to become a registered voter.

During this time, Coach Lewis was the founder and first chairman of the Montgomery County Democratic Conference, Second Congressional District Democratic Conference and the Alabama Democratic Conference (ADC), which is the Black Caucus of the state Democratic Party. Lewis later became Chairman of the Transportation Committee for the Montgomery Bus Boycott. He was co-founder of

the Montgomery Improvement Association; East Montgomery Branch of N.A.A.C.P., and New Southland Corporation, a group whose purpose was to help save land for black landowners and help with the proper utilization and management of that land. He served on the Board of Directors of the Montgomery Community Action Committee and the Montgomery Parks and Recreation Board.

He was elected to the Alabama House of Representatives in 1976, and gave up that position to accept the appointment by President Jimmy Carter, to become the first black United States Marshall for the Middle District of Alabama since reconstruction.

In 1994, a public library was dedicated and named in his honor. In 1995, Coach Lewis was inducted into the Alabama State Sports Hall of Fame.

He was co-owner of Ross-Clayton Funeral Home, Inc., where he served as Secretary-Treasurer and chairman of the Board of Directors.




