HHH SAYS JUSTICE, ORDER INSEPARABLE

Humphrey battle plan against crime and social injustices detailed in speech to National Press Club in Washington.

"Civil order and civil justice are not two goals, they are
one," says HHH. He rejects
"casual or cynical talk about a
'sick society'" as "an escape
from social responsibility or
an attempt to reduce the costs
of responsibility "

HHH's 5-point program for assuring civil order calls for toughening anti-riot laws, beefing up police, requiring registration of all firearms plus massive federal-state-local campaign against drug traffic.

To provide early warning system to detect and prevent disorders and "to hear the voices of those who have gone unheard," HHH proposes creating broadbased Councils for Civil Peace.

Also calls for fresh look-by public and programmers--at effect on children of TV violence.

"There is no choice today but to be tough-minded and fairminded about stopping crime and violence," says VP.

He stresses same no-nonsense approach needed to attack social ills and guarantee justice.

Basic civil rights, HHH says,

include right of every citizen
"to have enough to eat, to earn
a living, to gain a full education."

Calls for private-public cooperation, private employers to provide the jobs with government financial help when necessary.

HHH: AS 'CAPTAIN'

"If I am permitted to be President, I intend to be President.
I've noticed most Presidents are like that. They really don't take orders from Vice Presidents or anybody else.

"Hubert Humphrey as Vice President is a member of a team. Hubert Humphrey as President is captain of a team. There's a lot of difference."--Answering question before National Press Club.

VP HUMPHREY SPEAKS TO THE ISSUES

FREEDOM

"Once upon a time, a walled city was regarded as the limit of freedom.

"Once upon a time--before the one man, one vote belief--three-fifths of a man was freedom, under the Constitution.

"Once upon a time, 'separate but equal' was called freedom.

"Sir Henry Maine marked it as the whale's privilege to swallow the minnow.

"Yet, with all these definitions of freedom, freedom means so much more than any of these things for most people--especially the minnows--and quite a little less for the whales."--Speech to Bucknell Univ.

MOTHGARE

"America has to meet Youths' Bill of Rights. That means, as I have said for 18 years, the right to vote at an earlier age-at age 18.

"It means youths must not only accept responsibility but have a role in the decision-making process that defines those duties and responsibilities."--Speech to U. of Arkansas.

DEFENSE

"Our defense must be in greater depth than the fine line of the military. The defense of this Republic must be in its economy, in the education of its people, in the dedication of its people—and the service of its people—to itself and to others.

"These are the weapons of your defense. There is no military weapon system alone that can defend us. What I have spoken of are the weapons of defense and security that can be created by the civilians of this land."-- Speech to Coast Guard Academy.

"To put it directly, violence and riots are wrong--period. They are not responsible.

"To believe deeply in the idea of change--to believe that part of responsibility is to foment and promote change--is still, for me, to count the use of force and ultimatums on the campuses a form not of courage but of intellectual cowardice."--Speech to Bucknell Univ.

"I am not one who believes in a guaranteed annual income. I prefer to put my stake in providing jobs.


"I want to guarantee their income through their work. And I'll guarantee, as best I can to the helpless and the needy and the suffering, a decent standard of living through the generosity and compassion of the people of this country."—Answering question before National Press Club.

CHIESWARSHAMEDAN

"The Marshall Plan was a success in Europe primarily because it was worked out in concert with the recipient and the donor, with industry and labor and the people in the area who needed help.

"If we could make that work in Europe we can make it work in America. We have more management techniques and technology here, more management ability, more skilled workers, more resources to do with than they had there.

"The American people know that the Marshall Plan as foreign aid was a success. They'd like to believe they could have a similar success at home. And why can't they?"--Speech to National Press Club.

POLLS PROGRESS

HHH surges ahead of Nixon in latest Gallup and Harris polls.

Gallup gives VP 42% to 37% bulge over Nixon, shows McC with scant 2% lead--41% to 39%--over GOP front-runner.

"Humphrey has steadily gained ground since he announced his candidacy," Gallup reports.

Nixon trails HHH among both men and women nationwide, sampling shows.

Harris has HHH ahead of Nixon by 7%--43% to 36%, says: "The trend in the Humphrey-Nixon contest is clear--the Democratic Vice President has steadily widened his lead... Nixon's total appears to be remaining relatively constant, while Humphrey has picked up strength."

HHH has "more than 1,600 delegates, by a generally conservative count," NY Times reports on basis of national survey. Times adds, "Humphrey's

nomination for the presidency seems assured."

70% of county Democratic chairmen polled by Gallup favor HHH. Survey pointing up grass-roots support for Humphrey finds only 6% of county chairmen back McC.

HHH holds 3-1 delegate lead over McC, reports Miami Herald. With 954 delegates still to be chosen, at least 540 appear earmarked for Humphrey, says Herald, and observes: "It is hard at this point to see how any combination of McCarthy and favorite sons can deny Humphrey the nomination on the first roll call."

HHH "has the presidential nomination virtually locked in," says The Christian Science Monitor after 50-state survey.

Humphrey victory would pull in about 22 additional Democratic congressmen, predicts renowned statistician Louis H. Bean. He forecasts easy HHH win over Nixon in November.

HHH: NATO'S ROLE

"NATO--the most enduring and successful defense alliance in history--continues to be a necessity for Western Europe and ourselves. For two decades, NATO has contained aggressive power and deterred war.

"But the time for change has come.

"The time has come for the NATO alliance to look to that new, dynamic vision of peaceful engagement—to transform NATO from a defensive, military organization to an active, vital, political—social—economic tool which may hasten the replacement of the Iron Curtain with the Open Door."—Speech to American Iron and Steel Institute.

HHH: ON CHANGE

"What we want is not just change, but change for the good. What we need is someone who understands the ferment of change, the forces of change, and does not let those forces run wild but instead directs them so that the change is for social progress and not for anarchy.

"I do not think you demonstrate political leadership by tearing down everything around you. You demonstrate political leadership by building that which is needed.

"I intend to be that kind of builder."--Speech to National Press Club.

STOKES FOR HUMPHREY

Cleveland Mayor Carl Stokes
endorses HHH as "a man who has
intellectually and philosophically
and from a gut level identified
himself with [big city] needs
over the years." Stokes, first
elected Negro mayor of a major
U.S. city, praises Vice President's legislative contributions
in housing, fair employment
and education.

Humphrey is "the next President," Stokes tells Capital Press Club, because HHH is "the only one who can respond to the imperatives of the big city." ... Predicts HHH will win Ohio delegation because the "delegates realize that this is the kind of man they can go to the public in Ohio and sell... and he is the only Democratic candidate I know who can beat the probable Republican nominee."

Stokes cites HHH record as crusading Minneapolis mayor who recognized and fought to prevent big-city problems long before they reached the crisis stage. Party leaders back Vice President coast-to-coast, says Stokes, because they understand that "Humphrey is the one man who can go into these cities and come out with a vote because of his demonstrated concern and knowledge and commitment."

'AS YOUNG AS OUR HOPES'-HHH TO YOUTH



"Years alone are not a true measure of youth," HHH tells a Memorial Day audience. "We are as old as our despairs, and as young as our hopes; as old as our fears, as young as our faith; as old as the doubts we harbor, and as young as the ideals we sustain," the Vice President says at the site of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.

Eight outstanding young

leaders declare support for Humphrey as the "best qualified" candidate and say he has "both the idealism and energy of youth and the maturity of 24 years experience in public life."

Joining HHH team are singer Nancy Sinatra; Cleveland Browns quarterback Frank Ryan who is a PhD in math; All-American Elvin Hayes of Houston, 1967 college basketball player of the year; Clarence Mitchell III, Maryland state senator; Harvard govt. professor George Quester; Robert Rose of Nevada, the nation's youngest Democratic state chairman; Don Spero of Glencoe, Ill., world sculling champion now Columbia U. physics PhD candidate; Sanford Greenberg, former Oxford scholar, White House Fellow, now board chairman of EDP Technology, Inc.

ENDORSEMENTS

Sen. Joseph Montoya joins HHH
team. Humphrey is "good friend
of the Southwest," says the
senator from New Mexico, calling
the VP the one man who "can
unite the Democratic Party and
the nation at a time when
divisiveness is too much with us."

Gov. Calvin Rampton of Utah backs HHH for President "as the man best qualified to lead our country forward today." Rampton, only Democratic governor in the continental West, says VP "would be the strongest Democratic candidate in the state of Utah."

951 ILGWU delegates give HHH unanimous endorsement. They greet the Vice President with thunderous 20-minute ovation, interrupt his speech to their convention with applause 20 times.

More strong labor support

for Humphrey displayed in Communications Workers poll. It shows
72% backing among CWA officials
in 5 south-central states.

COPE on HHH: "His record of effectiveness is his long suit."
Says AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Education: "Humphrey has never lost touch with working people, minority groups, the poor and dispossessed."

One of two Negro delegates from Alabama endorses VP Humphrey. Joe L. Reed of Montgomery is first Alabama delegate to announce support of anyone other than Wallace.

CWA FOR VP

400,000-member CWA union backs
HHH "wholeheartedly and enthusiastically."

Nation's progress is "stamped with the ideas and ideals of Hubert Humphrey," says Communications Workers of America resolution endorsing VP, and adds: "The list of achievements of this truly remarkable man are seemingly endless."

Union calls HHH the candidate who will "mold national unity and lead without producing division."

DELEGATE BOOM GROWS

HHH delegate lead mushrooms with solid victories in Indiana, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Idaho and Florida

VP gets 57 delegates in convention showdown in Indiana.

HHH's home state of Minnesota gives him all 20 of its at-large delegates, total of $38\frac{1}{2}$ of 52.

Humphrey polls 83 of 125
Pennsylvania delegates. UDH
headcount puts another 7 of 20
Pennsy votes in HHH corner.

HHH nets 70 of Michigan's 96 delegate votes after telling cheering state convention his brand of liberalism is "the steady dedication of a lifetime and not a short and frenzied burst of emotion."

Missouri gives VP Humphrey all 60 of its delegate votes if unit rule is adopted.

59 of 63 Florida delegation votes are won by slate heavily favoring HHH. Sen. George Smathers, the favorite son, heads the delegation.

24 of 26 Montana delegate votes gained by HHH.

Idaho delegates back Humphrey



HHH 'MARSHALL PLAN' TO SOLVE URBAN ILLS

Attack on critical urban problems would be concentrated and coordinated under HHH "Marshall Plan" for the cities.

Local initiative stressed in VP's plan, along with careful planning, coordinated policy, strict priorities and massive commitment.

Program will generate a will for self-help, and thus self-sufficiency and prosperity, Humphrey notes.

The plan would establish a
National Urban Development Bank
for underwriting loans, but
"private business, labor, banks,
industry and universities must
assume their full share of the

burden," says the VP.

"Social progress has never been--nor should it be--primarily a responsibility of the public sector...and I am for keeping it that way," he adds.

Simplified administration of human and urban redevelopment programs, Humphrey says will provide a program which rewards innovation and desire to act-not one which destroys slowly and drains enthusiasm, effectiveness and vision of leaders.

"This is essentially a proposal to commit ourselves to paying whatever is the cost not just of saving, but perfecting our cities," he concludes.

VP SPEAKS TO THE ISSUES

DISARMAMENT

"The next President must be prepared to push the careful quest for disarmament even further--worldwide--so that our children may, for the first time in their lives, know a world where the balance of nuclear terror and the arms race are not a part of daily life...and where material and human resources go to the right, and not the wrong things."--"Truman Day," July 6

EMPLOYMENT

"The next President must assert the right of every American to earn a living--to work and earn.

"I don't believe that anyone wants a welfare check or a handout. I believe that people want the dignity and self-respect that comes from an honest job.

"And now it is within our power to see that everyone who wants a job has that job. And for those who cannot support themselves because of age, illness or disability, it is time to provide enough help to permit people to lift their heads in self-respect."

EDUCATION

"Ignorance is an alien force in America, the enemy of everything we seek and everything we stand for.

STEVENSON NAMED

Adlai Stevenson III joins HHH team as a UDH Vice Chairman, plans extensive nationwide speaking tour for VP.

The Illinois State Treasurer, whose father twice was the Democratic presidential nominee, also will play role in over-all strategy and policy planning.

"I don't suppose there was anyone in public life for whom my father had greater respect," Stevenson says of HHH, adding: "The story of his political creativity is endless."

CORBOY TAKES POST

Philip Corboy is newly named resident planning coordinator for UDH at Nat'l Convention.

A Chicago attorney and former YD Nat'l Committeeman from Illinois, Corboy will work under UDH Co-Chairman Sen. Walter Mondale and Exec. Dir. Lawrence Hayes on physical arrangements for VP's campaign organization at the convention.



RENOUNCE EXTREMES

Totalitarianism and tactics of the street are denounced by the Vice President, in Missouri for "Truman Day." HHH scores persons who "chant and jeer...who rigidly enforce their will when in the majority but loudly cry 'foul' and walk out when they lose.

"All this violates the principle of majority rule and endangers respect for minority rights," HHH says.

POLLS... DELEGATES

Humphrey gains in Michigan, will get at least 63 of the state's convention votes, AP poll shows, a gain of 25 votes since the previous survey two weeks before. The VP gets 61 Michigan votes, delegate caucus shows (of 92 present, 10 absent); 12 go for McCarthy, 15 have no preference yet, 4 opt for "others."

CWA delegates favor HHH. Poll of members at Communications Workers of America convention shows majority feel Humphrey is best choice of candidates for President.

HHH seeks probe of charges that Mississippi excludes Negroes from full participation in state convention. He asks Attorney General Clark to review charges in light of federal laws

protecting individual's rights to full participation in political process.

Democratic Party's Equal Rights Committee chairman, New Jersey Gov. Richard Hughes, is urged by Humphrey to make sure 1968 convention complies fully with equal rights resolution passed at Atlantic City in 1964.

Humphrey always has championed equal rights. He electrified 1948 convention delegates with speech in which he said, "I do not believe there can be any compromise on the guarantee of rights...There can be no hedging—no watering down...the time has come for the Democratic Party to...walk forthrightly into the bright sunshine of human rights." In 1964 his was the role of peacemaker between warring delegations from Mississippi to the convention.

VP LISTS PRIORITIES

Reduction of offensive and defensive weapons systems backed by the Vice President, who puts peace at the top of list of man's rights.

Free exercise of rights is key to man's liberation, he says in July 4th address asking rededication to rights of man.

America's immediate goals include assurance people may walk the streets of cities without fear; work for all who want work and income for those who cannot work, HHH says.

Other top priority goals include decent open housing; high standards of education, training and opportunity; participation of maximum number of citizens in the business of government.

NUMBER ONE ISSUE

Civil order and civil justice-"the No. 1 issue troubling the American people today," says HHH.

"I think what the American people want is a law-abiding country... where we can make our changes without lawlessness.

"I think they want a President who will speak out vigorously against disorder and violence and crime in the streets, and the looting and burning and all that goes with what we've seen."

Outstanding law enforcement authorities advise the VP on crime problems and social justice in newly-appointed task force co-chaired by James Q. Wilson, Harvard government professor, and Henry S. Ruth, law professor at U. of Pennsylvania.



HHH PLAN: POLICY PANEL TO SOLVE PROBLEMS

An "open presidency" to make government more responsive to the individual citizen is HHH goal.

National Domestic Policy Council is VP's proposal to "stimu-late frankest, widest discussion of America's problems, and marshal the spirit and energies of America to meet them."

Such a council "would expand the President's capacity to foresee and deal with the crush of domestic problems, and to sharpen priorities and identify full implications of alternative domestic policy decisions," he says.

The next President must "strive to reach the people whose disappointment in America is keenest-including the most idealistic of our young-because their basic hope for America is perhaps deepest," the Vice President says.

Give citizens new channels of communication with the President; create Councils of Citizens in the Executive Branch. Encourage "new spirit of localism" and "new combinations of governments, private groups and individuals for domestic problem solving" says Humphrey.

MORE VOTES FOR VP

More delegates pledge for HHH. VP's lead widens as Washington state adds all 5 at-large delegates to Humphrey column--his total there now 31-1/2.

Colorado adds another 16 delegate votes for VP, compared to 12 for McCarthy. Remaining uncommitted are 7 delegate votes for the late Sen. Kennedy.

HHH: GIVE PEOPLE VOICE ON PLATFORM

Platform writers should seek citizens' advice, HHH says, proposing public hearings throughout nation before convention.

"The currents of change which are running swiftly in America " are noted by the VP in a letter to Platform Committee Chairman Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana.

"Every Democrat must have a voice" in shaping the Platform if the Democratic Party is to be "truly responsive to the needs and problems of the future," HHH says.


GALLUP POLL

"I have spent a lifetime working for peace. I am one of the authors of the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty. I helped perfect the nuclear non-proliferation treaty. I am the author of the Peace Corps. I am the author of the Disarmament Agency. I fought for universal and general disarmament long before some people even dared to speak up for it. are building blocks of peace, and I have had a hand in fashioning all of these building blocks. And I am going to continue to speak responsibly about building this edifice of peace."

VIOLENCE NO CURE

"There is no excuse for violence in our democratic society. The idea that violence will remedy social ills is an age-old fallacy which has brought untold suffering to mankind. America need not and will not tolerate it."—Labor convention, June 4.

MIDDLE EAST

"Ever since the creation of the state of Israel, which I enthusiastically supported, I have felt that a stable peace in the Middle East is a must.



HHH PRESENTS PLAN TO AID FARMERS

"Farmers must have the same economic chance that others in our economy enjoy," declares HHH.

"I want our basic farm programs improved, adequately funded and made permanent," says VP, declaring strong public programs necessary "to deal with the difficult problems of maintaining reasonable prices and balance of supply and demand."


Humphrey urges sizable increase in lending authority of Farmers Home Administration to help ease farm credit squeeze.

Asks more be done about expanding markets for farm commodities here and abroad and promises fight to hold down increasing production costs.

We need people with a specific agricultural background permanently located at critical points throughout the government," says Humphrey, including the Tariff Commission, Council of Economic Advisers, Bureau of the Budget, and National Domestic Policy Council, which he would create in the White House.

Strategic reserves of major commodities should be kept at common-sense, clearly defined levels, says HHH, and program should specify how and when they are released "so they don't interfere with the market."

VP also favors stronger farm cooperatives and expansion of credit to all co-ops.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP KEY TO CITIES STRUGGLE

Maximum practicable public investment in 'minority' enterprise is needed to give minority groups a chance to help themselves, succeed and bring new economic vitality to inner-city, says Vice President.

HHH urges broad federal programs coupled with expanded private sector participation.

"Significant liberalization of federal policies regarding loans and allocations for inner-city entrepreneurs" necessary, says VP.

Expansion of federal agency commitments to private companies to create inner-city subsidiaries and tax incentives to generate a 'maximum degree of private investment at accelerated pace are part of Humphrey proposal.

"Capital, training and markets are three basic elements of business success," says VP, proposes: Financing wide variety of busi-

ness enterprises in inner-city by National Urban Development Bank offering loans to small businessmen and neighborhood cooperatives, guaranteeing conventional loans, and funding non-profit neighborhood development corporations.

Expanding Manpower Development and Training Act to include training in managerial and entrepreneurial skills; expanding GI Bill coverage to provide for inshop training; including such training in Defense Department's program for returning servicemen.

Expanding markets by enlarging program of assigning federal contracts and sub-contracts to businesses owned and operated by minority groups or hiring hard-core unemployed; assuring guarantees of full, equal consideration by federal agencies of competitive bids by minority firms.



Humphrey best choice to defeat Republican hopefuls, various surveys indicate.

Minnesotans rate HHH ahead of McCarthy in races against both Nixon and Rockefeller, the "Minnesota Poll" shows.

VP gets 85%, Nixon 9%, Wallace 5% of DFL voters, 1% undecided. McCarthy polls 77%, Nixon 11%, Wallace 7% with 5% undecided.

Humphrey lead over Nixon, says "Minnesota Poll," has increased from 7 points in May to 14 in July, with HHH ahead 52-38.

HHH is overwhelming choice of Negro voters, study shows.
