BEGINNER'S TENNIS TIPS - WILL PURSWELL

1. Always wear proper footwear. By doing this you protect your feet and the court surface. (Tennis shoes only)
2. Expensive rackets do not make the tennis player. Only after much practice will the quality of the racket make a real difference.
3. Good Tennis balls are essential. You would not learn to play golf with a ball that was too light or the wrong size.
4. Learn the rules. Rules and basic instructions may be found in most regular and sports encyclopedia.
5. Tennis is a game of concentration. Avoid making loud noises and talking.
6. Always watch the ball, you will get better quicker. (If you stop to look directly at your opponent, he will be smiling, I promise.)
7. Never go on another occupied court for a ball, ask nicely. It is proper to return balls at the end of rallies. Be patient.
8. Tennis is a life time sport, try it, you'll like it.
9. If you have questions regarding rules or etiquette ask the director.
10. Watch others. Much can be learned by watching better players.

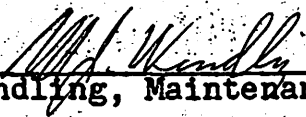
SUBJECT: Building Vandalism

DATE: February 8, 1972

The condition of this unoccupied wing of Hale School has been vandalized so badly that one would have to see it to believe it. I recommend that the Board see it is possible, almost all windows have been broken, most doors are ruined or broken into. The plaster has been knocked off the walls. The wiring has been pulled out of the walls in a lot of areas. The whole building is in a state of filth. Mr. Andrews and I looked at this building last spring or last summer and at that time the building was not in this shape, although there was some evidence of vandalizam.

I was told by the attendant Willie James Harris that the Board of Education removed all sanitary plumbing and kitchen sinks and all radiators for heating, from this building. The wiring is so damaged that I am sure that at least the part of the building that the Board might choose to restore for recreational use would have to be rewired.

Just making a guess I would say it would cost between \$2000.00 or \$3000.00 to fix up two or three rooms and bathrooms in the most modern section. To get a true estimate I would have to know how much of the building the Board intends to use.
