Since the National Association of Social
Workers (NASW) was adopted in 1979
several social work theorists have
suggested a variety of models to help
practitioner make ethical judgments.
Critics have cautioned that what
some social workers consider sound

ethical judgment may be no more than make-biased value judgments. The heart of the Argument is whether the cognitive dimensions of ethics is different between Males and Females. Women tended to evaluate situations contextually, whereas most men evaluate situations abstractly. The results of this study raise a number of important considerations

for the social work profession and for the field of morals development.

The high scores of female social workers relative to male scores suggested that men and women social workers may evaluate ethical problem differently.

Child Welfare is one of the oldest fields of practice in social work and one in which social work has been affected by a variety of factors, including increasing professionalization. Social workers have noted with concern a

perceived move away from the professional
historic mission to serve the oppressed
and disadvantage.

Many Child Welfare agency
personnel have been disillusioned
with graduate social work training
that they perceived to be incongruent
with the nature of agency practice.
Clinical Welfare for children dwell on
(1) protective service, (2) adoption, (3) and foster care.

Social work, educators, social work
student, and public child welfare personnel
need to focus on these issues.
